Bulungibwansi involves activities that check on the sanitation of communities; cleaning of market places, collecting and properly disposing rubbish and garbage in various areas, cleaning wells and pranting trees among others. It is a continuous and daily activity practiced on a day today basis in Buganda. It is one of the pillars on which the culture of orderliness in Buganda and respect for one another is founded.



Bulungibwansi framework gets fully and well implemented through being organized by specific

- structures, organizations, associations and organs of Buganda Kingdom. This activity is much
- emphazised on all levels of administration in Buganda: Villages, Parishes, Sub Counties, Counties
- and the Kingdom at large. Bulungibwansi has further circulated to regions beyond Buganda. This has been possible thanks to associations like; Nkobazambogo, Buganda Youth Council, Rotary and others who have adopted Bulungibwansi

- Bulungibwansi climaxes in the month of October every year, with a week long activities, graced
- by His Majesty the Kabaka himself on the final day with his presence and appearance to the

public on 8th October, which according to history is the day Buganda as a state was granted independence from British rule.

October. Butondebwansi involves planting of trees and flowers on individual and group basis.

shores and wetlands are protected from pollution with waste and chemicals
